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Happiness" is the Joy of Christmas in my heart!

When this bulletin gets sent out, we will be about to enter Advent, the season to prepare our hearts for the glorious celebration of the birth of Jesus, "the reason for the season." This time of year is filled with many traditions with origins in countries all over the world. By far, my favorite tradition is the Christmas tree. A legend of the Christmas tree says that St. Boniface, missionary to the Germans in 721 AD, destroyed the "Thunder Oak" of mighty Thor and used a little fir tree as a tool of evangelizing the pagan people. He said, "This little tree, a young child of the forest, shall be your holy tree tonight. It is the wood of peace...It is the sign of an endless life, for its leaves are ever green. See how it points upward to heaven. Let this be called the tree of the Christ-child. Gather about it in your own home where it will shelter deeds and gifts of love and rites of kindness."

The first tree that I decorate every year is the 10 foot tall Chrismon tree in my church sanctuary. The ornaments on the tree have Christian symbolism and have mostly been hand-made by members of my church. One of my favorites is the butterfly, symbol of Christ's resurrection, that I made from Alencon lace left from making my wedding dress. On its wings are the Greek symbols of the Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end, that are fashioned in gold beads.

When I was a child, as far back as I can remember, my whole family would go searching through the woods for a tree for Daddy to chop down to carry home for us all to decorate. What wonderful memories I have of those times. One memory is of the Christmas when I got married. I arrived home a few days before Christmas and my wedding to find that there was no Christmas tree. The dining room where the tree was always placed was full of wedding gifts. That being unacceptable, my sister and I drove into Thomson to find a tree. We bought the very last tree to be found and it looked something like Charlie Brown's tree. It took a lot of work but we finally made it look like the prettiest tree the family ever had.

When my own children were small, we followed the same tradition of going to the woods to find a cedar tree. The last year we did this, we searched what seemed like forever. There was no "good" tree to be found so we carried two trees home. The better one went in the tree stand. Then we drilled holes in the trunk where there were bare spots. Branches from the other tree were inserted into the holes to finally get a well shaped tree. This became one of our Christmas tales....."Do you remember the Christmas when........" From then on we got our trees at a tree farm.

Those family trees were always covered with ornaments made by my three children and the gift ornaments given to them each year from friends. Each child's ornaments were kept in a separate box which went with them when they married and moved to their own homes.

To this day, even though I live alone with my cat G.G., I go to Busy Elves tree farm on Thanksgiving weekend and bring home a fresh tree to decorate. Many of the ornaments placed on my tree have been gifts from friends through the years and souvenirs of places I have visited. G.G. even loves to lie under the decorated tree and stare at the lights and sparkles while I sit by the fireplace and do the same. The lighted star at the top of my tree symbolizes the Bethlehem star of the Christ-child and I am filled with love, joy and peace as I think of God's Christmas gift to the world. Thank you St. Boniface for the wonderful tradition of the Christmas tree.

Many wishes from me to you that your traditions will bring you Joy and Happiness this Christmas!


Grace says, "The true Joy of Christmas comes to me every year when I sing about the birth of Christ with my church choir during our Christmas Cantata."


For Maureen, Joy and Happiness during the Christmas season revolves around family time; glorious celebrations; music and laughter; praise and thanksgiving.



One of my favorite reads this Fall has been *SEC Sports Quotes Compendium*, compiled by Chris Warner. The words of wisdom from the most revered of SEC coaches provide great leadership insight for Pilots and other teams and organizations, as well. This month's quotes are from the legendary Steve Spurrier, "Discover the talent that God has given you. Then, go out and make the most of it" and "If I'm a good football coach, it's because of my mistakes. I try to learn from them."

These simple statements are filled with leadership wisdom for Pilots. We need to take on jobs in Pilot and when we do well, continue and do more, making the most of our talents. When you realize what you're good at, it usually makes the job easy and enjoyable. Capitalize on what you're good at and contribute every month and every year to help your club work well, serve others, raise funds, and gain new members. You could also bake and bag cookies for your club to use as Pick Me Ups. Plan for involvement of all members through work shifts and various assigned tasks, so that none are overworked. Volunteer and follow through—you will be appreciated!

If you're good at motivating others, take on a membership drive or a fundraiser and motivate all members to action to help make it a success. You are using your talent to benefit your club, which in turn, will benefit your community.

Considering Spurrier's second quote, as Pilots, we should learn from our mistakes and strive to change what we did, abandon a weak or unsuccessful project, or tweak it in key ways to make it stronger and better. We should also learn from our mistakes in dealing with others. Vow to listen more, support others more, and make changes in our words and deeds to coach others to action and success. Go Team Pilot!


