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
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"KEEPER OF THE KEYS" JUDY JACKSON **GA DISTRICT GOVERNOR**

We will have an "Immediate Release" article available to go with the picture to the newspaper, explaining what PIFF is all about to which you may add more information on your clubs' other activities in your community.



Now is the age of technology!! I think some of us have been pulled "kicking and screaming" into this age, but we are here. How does this affect your club? Good question!

What is the correct protocol for **electronic voting** when a vote on an item of business needs to be taken before the next meeting? Consulting with our Pilot International Parliamentarian and others, it was noted that the procedure for electronic voting is included in the newest edition of *Roberts' Rules of Order*.

Pilot International Bylaws only address this issue as it pertains to the International Administrative Council where it states that electronic voting may be used; therefore, this method of voting will not be in conflict with PI Bylaws. It is suggested that all members should be advised of any vote being taken by this method, and this can be done by calling or emailing each member prior to the vote being sent so they will be prepared to respond. Also, any member not receiving email should be sent a paper ballot. As with any item of business, caution and common sense should be used.

It is suggested that clubs should consider having members vote as to whether they would like this method of voting utilized if needed between meetings. If so, a suggestion would be to include this item in their Standing Rules.
