

PILOT Clubs are required to file Form 990 by Nov. 15, 2014 deadline

All Pilot clubs are required to file a form 990, 990EZ or file the electronic 990N between July 1 and November 15 of each year. The filing of the form is based on the annual gross income. Gross income means the amount of income for the year for the organization and any other parts of the organization if those parts use the same EIN as the club (i.e.: If your Anchor Club uses your EIN, you must include their receipts too.) Gross income includes everything taken in including dues, fundraising revenue, contributions, interest, etc. If the gross income is less than \$50,000, the club must file a Form 990N electronically. You may find the form on-line at www.irs.gov or http://epostcard.form990.org. This form must be filed every year by every club!!!!! The fiscal year should be July 1 to June 30.

If you fail to file the required 990 for 3 consecutive years, your nonprofit status will automatically be revoked ty the IRS. If a club's taxexempt status is revoked, the club will have to reapply for tax-exempt status – which will involve paying a fee and a lot of paperwork.

Once you have completed the filing of form 990 or 990N, print a copy of the form or confirmation that you have filed. *Keep a copy with your treasurer's records and email me that your club has filed.*

Members need to feel that they play a role in club decisions and that their opinion counts.

A stable core of experienced members is the backbone of your club. New members can lean on and learn from members who have a history of involvement. Members who actively participate in their club more than likely will want to continue their membership. Does your club present an atmosphere of fellowship and friendship, and provide opportunities for club members to exercise their talents and abilities? Members need to feel at home and have a continuing reason to belong. Find ways to use the talents of ALL members.

Pilots, I encourage each of you to take 15 minutes each week during November to step out of your "comfort zone" and do something positive for your club. This may be as easy as inviting friends to a club meeting or just reaching out to a fellow club member you do not know very well. As a possible suggestion for highlighting a club member and getting to know a club member better would be to have a monthly:

"Mystery Member – Guess Who?"

Each month feature an article highlighting a mystery club member in club newsletter. This would involve calling a club member for a short interview to ask a few questions that would describe the club member and then send a short article to club newsletter editor for publishing. When the Membership Division reports at the club meeting, club members will be allowed to guess who the mystery member is. Give a small prize for correct guess. This would be an excellent way for everyone to get to know club members better.

With the start of a New Year fast approaching, it is time to turn attention to the Georgia District Awards!!! That's right....each club has the opportunity to submit entries and be officially recognized at the Georgia District Convention coming up in April. It truly does not matter the size of your club or where you are located – submitting an entry can be for every club!

To give each of you a bit of some background: last year a task force comprised of 3 Past Governors, including yours truly, was appointed by the Governor to review and make recommended changes to the Georgia District Awards. Changes and recommendations were submitted and approved and all of the revised entry forms have now been placed on the Georgia Pilot website. Please review the criteria and directions carefully for those changes. The awards have been brought "up to date" with the current PI terminology (such as Pilot International Founders Fund instead of PIF) as well as to recognize the "A, B, C's "of Pilot.

The awards "up for grabs" are the Ann Adams Attendance Award, the Edwina Gill Growth Award, the Nancy Henrick Friendship and Service Award, and the Vivian Hartman Memorial Award.

One award has been eliminated due to lack of entries received over the past 5 years and that is the Elizabeth Green Umhau Safety Award.

For your club's achievements to earn an award/s, you have to enter competition by completing the applications as found on the Georgia Pilot website and forwarding those forms to me. Applications must be properly completed, according to instructions, and postmarked- or emailed - no later than **Saturday, February 14th**, **2015.**

Other awards that will be announced at District Convention are: Anchor Club of the year as well as the awarding of the Anchor Scholarships. Last, but certainly not least, the Governor's Cup will be presented to the most outstanding club of 2013-2014, chosen from the applications that have already been received.

I look forward to receiving lots of applications from you in February, and if you have any questions, please do not hesitate to seek help from your Lt. Governor or me.
