**Intelligence as a Leadership Trait**

Hello Pilots,

Intelligence is something that can be difficult to develop. The road toward becoming more intelligent is difficult, long and can't be completed without investing considerable time. Developing intelligence is a lifestyle choice. Your high school and college graduation was the beginning of your education, not the end. In fact, much of what is taught in college functions merely as a foundational language for lifelong educational experiences.

To develop intelligence you need to commit to continual learning—both formally and informally. You could take college courses on-line or at a local

college. Informally, you can develop a great deal of intelligence in any field simply by investing a reasonable amount of time to reading on a daily basis. Spending 30 minutes of focused reading every day will give you 182 hours of study time each year.

For the most part, people will notice if you are intelligent by observing your behavior and attitude. One of the greatest signs of someone who is truly intelligent is humility.

You can demonstrate your intelligence by gently leading people toward understanding—even when you know the answer. Your focus needs to be on helping others learn—not demonstrating how smart you are. Arrogance will put you in a position where people are secretly hopeful that you'll make a mistake and appear foolish.

Learning from the people you lead by asking intelligent thoughtful questions will

do more to enhance your intelligence credibility than just about anything. Of course this means you need to be capable of asking intelligent questions.

Your ability to demonstrate respect for the intellect of others will probably do more to influence the perception of your intellect than your actual intelligence.

By consciously making an effort to exhibit these five traits: honesty, forward-looking, competent, inspiring, and intelligence, people will be more likely to follow you. These are the most important traits that people look for in their leaders. By exhibiting them on a regular basis, you will be able to grow your influence to its potential as a leader.

complete a task. Keep your eye on the prize.

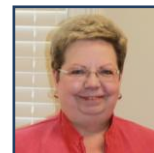
3. Write your goals. Make them real and achievable. If you don't write them down, it will be too easy to forget about them. That's why we do plans of work for our clubs, isn't it?
4. Plan thoroughly. Be sure to cover everything, even the small things.
5. Involve others. One person can't do it all and shouldn't even try. Your Pilot club is a team. Keep your team involved.
6. Welcome failure. That one probably surprised you. Sometimes failure is the thing that influences us to change the way we do things. You need to learn and re-strategize.
7. Take purposeful action. Be sure that you take the action necessary to reach your goal. The road must lead you somewhere.
8. Inspect what you expect. Evaluate your progress. Were your goals

realistic? Did you plan carefully and thoroughly? Did you involve your team?

9. Reward yourself. Not only should you give yourselves a pat on the back, but reward a job that is well done. Certificates are cheap and very easy to make. You can buy dollar gifts at dollar stores and reward members with them.
10. Maintain personal integrity. Above all things, remember that honesty and integrity are key in all that we do as Pilots. Never forget that!

I hope that all of you can apply these simple rules to the activities of your Pilot club and that you.

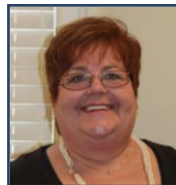

Thank you again Pilots for sharing in this Georgia District Project!

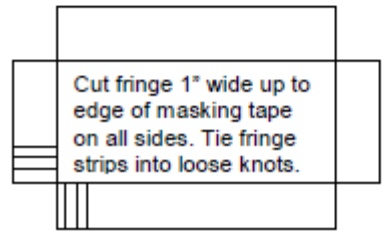
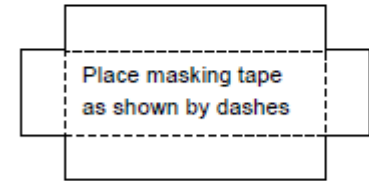
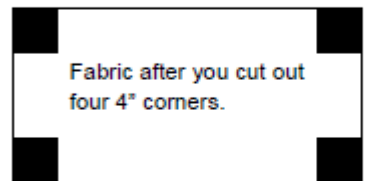

- 2 pieces of fleece approx. 60” x 54”
- Scissors
- Ruler or measuring tape
- 1” masking tape
- Trim off selvages
- Fleece wrong sides together

A worthwhile fundraiser today is the Restaurant Fundraiser. This fundraiser not only provides opportunity to raise funds, but also increases awareness of Pilot International and your club’s local goals. Of course we will not forget that this dining experience will bring Pilots, Anchors, family, friends and community together at social events.

Keep the following in mind if you are interested in Restaurant Fundraiser:

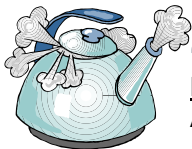
1. Start at least 30 days in advance.
2. Determine dates for fundraising. Remember participating restaurants usually offer the event during a weekday night.
3. Check with your local restaurants to determine who participates in holding the fundraiser to support non-profit organizations. Example- Ask how they might work to raise money for your event. Ask about a day where a percentage of proceeds- even a percentage from one specific food item-

goes to your Pilot club. They may desire to contribute by making an in kind donation towards a silent auction, run/walks or trivia night. Redeemable certificates/vouchers may be used. Some well known participating restaurants include, but are not limited to McDonalds, Arby’s, Krispy Kreme, Chick-Fil-A, Applebee’s, Buffalo Wild Wings, and CiCi’s. Willingness to participate varies from location to location.

4. Promote! Advertise! – Anchor club members may assist with this fundraiser. Some restaurants will give you flyers and stickers to handout or you can create your own. Flyers may need to be presented at the time of purchase for easy fundraiser identification.
5. Get volunteers to help you the day of the fundraising event

Remember that all Georgia District dues are due by November 1, 2012 and Pilot International dues are due by December 1, 2012.

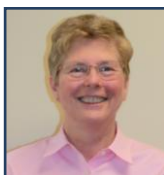

The tickets have been mailed to all the clubs who did not have a representative at Fall Council.

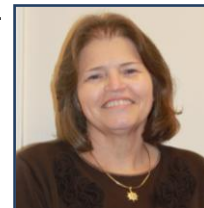
Club Presidents – if you have not received your club’s tickets please contact me now. The proceeds from the district raffle are split between the Georgia Pilot Foundation and Pilot International. The GPF portion is used to fund the six GPF Anchor Scholarships and PI’s portion is the Georgia District donation to Goals for Grants & Scholarships. Other than the cash awards given from the proceeds all the funds for the district raffle are used for scholarships or grants.

This year’s fundraiser is for nine “**Foundation Tea Pots**”. There will be 8 Tea Post awarded with \$250 in cash and one Tea Pot with \$1,000 in cash. Tickets are \$10 each or 4 or \$20.

Clubs are encouraged to pass a Tea Pot each month at their meetings to begin collecting funds to help cover the cost of buying tickets in the club name. Remember you can also sell tickets outside of the club. The drawing for the “Foundation Tea Pots” will be during the Award Luncheon at District Convention.

Clubs are also reminded to send in their annual \$100 GPF donation in honor of the Georgia District Anchors. 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**PARLIAMENTARIAN – PAT JARVIS**

During a Fall Council question/answer session concerning bringing club standing rules in sync with 2012 Pilot International bylaws, the question of where to count privileged members arose. As you know, we are no longer using the terms for different types of membership, included the term “privileged”.

For purposes of counting membership in Pilot International, the Change of Membership form is being revised and will include two membership categories as per our new bylaws: dues paying and non-dues pay. Dues paying is just that; all members who pay Pilot International dues. At the International level, dues are being waived for (a) Fifty Year Members, (b) current students, including former Anchors,

who are seeking higher education degrees and not paying club dues, (c) Scholarship recipients, at all levels of Pilot, who are not paying Club dues, and (d) Emeritus Members, and (e) military personnel who are deployed from their home station. You will want to include these in your Standing Rules if you also want to waive your Club dues for these individuals.

For club standing rules, it is **suggested** clubs may want to include a section in their standing rules indicating if the Board or the Membership will have the right to waive attendance. In GA District, having the Ann Adams Attendance Award, we record the attendance of members present during our meetings to submit to GA District. You will want your secretary to keep a record of those individuals whose attendance has

been waived by either the Board (or Club).

GA District standing rules are being revised to reflect the 2012 PI bylaws and will be presented at our District Convention in April 2013. Current GA District Award forms should be used for the current award cycle. They can be found on the GA District web site <http://pilotgeorgia.org/> under the Forms dropdown. They will be revised during the current club year for use 2013-2014 club year.

One of the most exciting and rewarding events I've attended this Fall was the 28<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Art Exhibition, Awards Presentation, and Luncheon of the Georgia Artists with DisAbilities, Inc. sponsored by the Pilot Clubs of Metro Atlanta. What a wonderful event held at the GA Power Corporate Headquarters in Atlanta!

Seeing the artists come forward and accept their awards was special to all in attendance! Viewing the artwork, from paintings, watercolors, photography, drawings, clay pieces, jewelry, to fabric art, collage, and mixed media was exciting. I enjoyed visiting and re-visiting the exhibit itself, admiring the artwork while selecting two beautiful pieces to purchase.

The mission of GA Artists with DisAbilities is to provide a medium through which GA artists with disabilities can display their artistic accomplishments in all disciplines of the arts and to create public awareness of the artistic skills that these artists have developed by overcoming a disability. There were 91 GA artists who submitted their work this year.

This organization was begun by Pilots in 1985. The following clubs now work together to plan, carry out, and sponsor this most rewarding event: Pilot Club of Atlanta, Pilot Club of Cherokee County, Pilot Club of Conyers, Pilot Club of Covington, Pilot Club of Marietta, Pilot Club of Sweetwater, and the Peachtree Pilot Club of Atlanta. This year's chairman and emcee for the event was Nancy Shealy of the Peachtree Pilot Club.

The juried exhibit produced some 45 winning pieces which are now on tour until July 13, 2013 in various cities and locations

throughout Georgia, including libraries, galleries, hospitals, and arts centers. The locations, dates, and contacts for hours and information are on a separate page in this Governor's Bulletin. I hope that you will be able to see this year's exhibit in a location near you.

Next year in late September will be another opportunity to attend the Georgia Artists with DisAbilities Art Exhibition, Awards Program, and Luncheon in Atlanta. You will be greatly enriched by attending this event.

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**NEW LYNDA GOODWIN  
VOLUNTEER SCHOLARSHIPS**



an essay on what their community service has meant to them.

The scholarship will be named in honor of Lynda Goodwin. Lynda is a Past Governor, has been a Pilot for 22 years and has served with the Girl Scout Council for over 30 years. She has constantly worked through Pilot and Girl Scouts to encourage volunteer service in our youth. GPF will award two Lynda Goodwin Volunteer Scholarships for the 2012 – 2013 year.

The Georgia Pilot Foundation is offering a new scholarship for Pilot Clubs that do not sponsor an Anchor Club.

When GPF was formed a large majority of our District Pilot Clubs sponsored Anchor Clubs. Unfortunately over the years the number of Pilot Clubs that sponsor an Anchor Club has dropped to less than 50%. As of August, 2012 there were 35 Anchor Clubs sponsored by only 26 Pilot Clubs. GPF was approached by several club representatives about offering a scholarship that the clubs who do not sponsor an Anchor Club could make available to students in their communities.

Pilot Clubs within the Georgia District that do not sponsor an Anchor Club will be eligible to submit one application per club for the Lynda Goodwin Youth Volunteer Scholarship. Applications will be available by October 20<sup>th</sup> on the Georgia District website – pilotgeorgia.org. Postmark due date for applications is February 1<sup>st</sup>, 2013.

The DAC/DEC has approved for GPF to offer two \$1,500 volunteer scholarships for these Pilot Clubs. This scholarship will be available to high school seniors. It will be scored similar to the current GPF Scholarship - on the student's volunteer service provided to their community, academic excellence, and

Pilot Clubs that currently sponsor an Anchor Club are not eligible for this new scholarship. They are eligible to submit applications for the six GPF Scholarships and the Georgia District Anchor Scholarships. These applications are also available on the Georgia district website.

serve as a district officer and club president at the same time. A nominee for Governor Elect will have served as a Regional Lt. Governor.

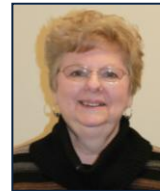
For further information on how nominate someone, go to the Pilot International website and review the PI Bylaws (Articles XVII and XX) for the qualifications and duties of district officers.

The Qualification Form for District Officers can be found the 2012-2013 Club Manual. All clubs may submit a qualified nominee for Governor Elect, Secretary and Treasurer. Beginning the

2013-2014 year, the Secretary has to be nominated and elected. Only clubs within a region may nominate persons for that region’s Lt. Governor.

An acceptance for nomination is not complete until the Chair of the Nominating Committee, Governor and PI Headquarters have received the nomination letter from the club, completed Qualification Form, Vision Statement, and letter of acceptance from the candidate to the club, postmarked by the due date, February 4, 2013. This is 60 days prior to the first day of District Convention.
